Australia's cities have shifted from centres of manufacturing and industry, to the drivers of our knowledge economy. This shift is being driven by a host of innovative and creative enterprises, involving new types of performance, artist and community spaces, as well as co-working, design, micro-manufacture, pop-up retailers, and entirely new business models.

Unfortunately, existing regulatory systems often lack clear criteria for these new forms of cultural and economic activity. Applicants frequently struggle to identify suitable building code and planning classifications, whilst consent authorities are faced with the complexity of assessing risk and amenity for previously unseen types of land and building use.

With the nation's creative industries vital to our future economy, Australian cities need regulatory frameworks which balance new ways of using our built environment without sacrificing safety, fire prevention, amenity or access standards.

This forum aims to bring together experts within the fields of building, planning, access and safety with those working within the cultural, creative and knowledge sector.

We invite those with an interest in this area to attend both a morning conference and afternoon workshops, with the goal of increasing understanding of new and creative land and building uses, and outlining a pathway towards better regulation.
